The Skills Challenge Certificate, alongside Supporting Qualifications is part of the overarching Welsh Baccalaureate. In order to achieve the overarching Welsh Baccalaureate, pupils must pass:

- GCSE English Language,
- GCSE Maths(or numeracy)
- Skills Challenge Certificate
- 3 further GCSEs (two of these might be equivalent qualifications) in addition

We understand that young people need to be adaptable to change, capable of learning new skills throughout life and equipped to cope with new life scenarios.






Caerphilly Youth Forum
