For the fifth time in a week, I'd bolted up in my bed, shaking and muttering incoherent things. Yet again, I'd had another nightmare. The strange and terrifying thing is I know I've been places. I know I've been out, because I have physical proof. The bad bit is, I can't remember a single thing about where I've been. I'll go to sleep, and I'll wake up as someone completely different. Currently I've been dealing with this condition for 6 years, 11 months and 7 days and 17 hours. I keep track. The worse thing is, I have no way of keeping contact with this other person. I know nothing about them, but every time I black out, just before actually, I see a red shiny bike with a white hanging basket and dirt covered tires with a slight puncture in each. I can never get that bike out of my head, and I wondered for a while if it was following me.

Two years ago I complained to a psychiatrist about it, and the end result was that I was put in a mental hospital for a few weeks. All I saw were those white padded walls, and the restraints that dug so far into my wrist that they leaked crimson and covered themselves in bruises. All the while I heard a second voice in my head, telling me to do bad things. I assumed that it was just the voices in my head from the insanity that had been caused in the facility, but the voice never gave me the answers I expected. Which meant that this voice was someone else. Someone who knew everything about me. Someone who turned against me.

Myself.

Someone who has been hosting my body for the past six years, using it at their leisure.

I decided to take a short stroll down to the evergreen park that had raised me when my parents chose not to, and there I saw a sight that frightened me to the point where it was no longer me in control of my body. I was drawn towards it yet my head told me to run. I knew I needed to get away but I couldn't bring my legs to move. It was the murky red bike, and while I was lost in thought, staring at the bike, wondering what it might be, I felt a hand around my mouth, and the last thing I remembered
